

New Fund Brings Comfort to Betty Hanten

Comfort. You might feel comforted with friends or family, a hug, fond memories or even a daily routine. Many find comfort as soon as they walk in their front door, sit in a favorite chair or gather at the table to share wholesome "comfort" food.

Betty Hanten of Watertown finds comfort in all those things.

"On the farm, lunch was always straight up at noon," she reminisced. For the kids, many times lunch meant a sack lunch, whether for school or during a break from chores. "I'd usually include a treat like chocolate chip cookies. If I really wanted to spoil them, I'd pack a piece of carrot cake. We always ate supper together." Meat and potatoes, as well as casseroles like calico beans were a staple. Now, many years later, Betty still makes her children and grandchildren their favorite comfort foods.

Betty and her husband, Herb, farmed for many years just south of Watertown. In the early 2,000s, they sold a portion of their land to the City of Watertown. That land was developed into the Hanten Industrial Park which led to the development of Glacial Lakes Energy. That



sale brought Herb some very meaningful comfort. "After that, he knew I would be taken care of," Betty said. "He had the forgone conclusion, he would go before me." Herb passed away in 2008.

Many organizations within Watertown bring Betty comfort. "I have personal experience with Watertown Area Transit," Betty said. "I don't drive. I really appreciate those drivers."

They're so good, whether they're picking up a school kid or someone with a walker. I have great affection for the Transit program."

"There's a tremendous amount of talent in the Town Players organization," Betty continued. "I've gone to almost every production they've had." The Boys and Girls Club of Watertown is a great place for our young people. And I wish we didn't need the Beacon Center, but the fact is, we do.

Betty takes comfort in not only knowing those organizations are there, but also knowing that she is able to help them forever through the Herb and Betty Hanten Family Fund she recently established at the Watertown Area Community Foundation.


"This has always been my community," she said. "I believe in this community and if there's anything I can do to help, I want to do it. That's all there is to it."

It's been an exciting time for Watertown. The Boys & Girls Club kicked off its "Opening Doors" campaign and announced plans for facility renovation.

Thanks to our donor support, the Watertown Area Community Foundation has awarded the largest grant in its history to the Club. This \$500,000 matching grant will be used to match \$250,000 in contributions to the Club's capital campaign and match \$250,000 in contributions to the Club's endowment fund.

The end result is an amazing \$1 million for the Club and its members. Capital campaign dollars will help with bricks and mortar for the Club's transformation which will assist the Club in meeting safety standards, creating innovative program opportunities and increasing organization efficiency. Growing the endowment fund will help the Club cover increased operating costs and maintenance of the upgraded space and programs into the future.

The Foundation and the Club share a long relationship. Since the Foundation's first grant to the Club in the early '80s, more than \$300,000 in Foundation grant monies have helped the Club in its mission. Those grants have supported everything from Legos and computers to programming and kitchen equipment.

There's not a lot you can get for \$1 anymore. But, believe it or not, you can impact your community with just \$1 a day through the Giving Back 365 program at the Watertown Area Community Foundation.

Almost \$12,000 was awarded to local organizations in 2015 by Giving Back 365 donors. Overall, almost \$42,000 has been awarded through the program since it began in 2012.

The following 2015 grants were awarded:

- \$2,000 to Beacon Center to purchase two new computers, accessories and software.
- \$1,200 to Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Glacial Lakes to purchase a new desk and locking filing cabinets for its office.
- \$1,776 to the Boys & Girls Club of Watertown to purchase four new tables to be used in the Education Center at the main club site.



HELP FOR HABITAT – Habitat for Humanity Greater Watertown Region was among the recipients of the 2015 Giving Back 365 grants awarded by Giving Back 365 donors. A grant of \$2,000 will support the purchase of new tools to help Habitat with its mission. The scaffold these workers are on was also due to a former Giving Back 365 grant.

\$2,000 to Habitat for Humanity Greater Watertown Region to purchase new tools including a compressor, miter saw and stand, framing nailer, wobble lights, cords, hoses, circular saw and hand tools.

- \$2,000 to Joy Ranch to purchase materials for a wooden deck with roof and ramp to make the archery program handicap accessible, as well as materials to construct six targets and arrow holders also for the archery program.
- \$1,406 to Lake Area Zoological Society to support the Watertown Wildlife Warriors program at Bramble Park Zoo.
- \$950 to PACH to purchase roll carts to aid in the entire process, from receiving bulk food to the end result of packing items into the packs that are distributed to program participants.

If you haven't already done so, we encourage you to join the 2016 Giving Back 365 effort. Half of your contribution is used for grants in the current year and half is placed in an endowed fund to support future grants. As a member, you are eligible to participate in the grant-making process.
